**Meeting Summaries:** Consultation Council reviewed the summary from the June 18, 2015 meeting.

**Workforce Task Force Update:** update by Van Ton-Quinlivan  
Council received an update from Vice Chancellor Van Ton-Quinlivan on the Board of Governors Task Force on Workforce, Job Creation and a Strong Economy:

Members of Consultation Council expressed recommendations and concerns with bridging gap between the Board of Governors, the Consultation Council, and the State for decision making.

**State and Federal Legislative Update:** update by Vincent Stewart  
Vice Chancellor Vincent Stewart provided an update on the most recent actions of the State Legislature and the Governor, as well as a Federal update. The Council also received detailed information on bills and including AB 288, AB 542, and AB 770.

1. AB 288: Encourages a modest expansion of voluntary dual enrollment partnerships by reducing fiscal penalties and policy barriers that currently limit such collaborations.
2. AB 542: Exempts Early College High School (ECHS) and Middle College High School (MCHS) students from the lowest priority enrollment consideration.
3. AB 770: The Budget Act included language from earlier versions of AB 770 to create the Community Colleges Basic Skills Innovation Program.

**Other:** Student Senate rep, Victor Chavarin, reported on the Student Senate Training Session that occurred the week before as well as having elected an entirely new board of 24 Senators.
